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To Child Care Facilities and Families: What you need to know about measles

Measles is spreading in BC right now. This letter has important information to help keep your child, your family, and our Child Care settings safe. Measles spreads easily, but we can help stop it with vaccines and knowing what to do if we are exposed to it.

Vaccines help protect us

Getting the measles vaccine is the best way to stay safe!

Remember to provide your licensed Child Care Facility the most up to date immunization status
of your child(ren) attending. (Child Care Licensing Regulation Section 57(2)(a)).

When Northern Health confirms there is an exposure of measles in a childcare setting, children and employees may continue attending the program if they are not symptomatic and have had measles in the past or had at least one vaccine. People are protected if they:

- Had at least 1 measles vaccine: 1 vaccine is 85 -95% effective and 2 vaccines are 99% effective.
- Were born before 1970 (likely had measles as a child)
- Already had measles

What measles looks like

Symptoms of measles show up **7 to 21 days** after being near someone who has measles (if you catch the virus). These symptoms include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Runny nose

- Red or watery eyes
- A rash that starts on the face and neck, then spreads

If someone has measles

They should stay home and away from other people until at least 4 days after the rash starts. This helps stop the virus from spreading. If you need to go to the doctor or hospital, please call first so the staff can get ready.

Extra care for some people

Measles can be a very serious illness for people who are not protected, particularly young children, and those who and who are pregnant or are immunocompromised. If you are worried about the health of your child or family member related to measles, call **your doctor** or the **Northern Health Virtual Clinic** right away. They can help you get care and medicine to stay safe.
